Founded in 1978 in honor of the late Senator and Vice President, the **Hubert H. Humphrey Fellowship Program** provides a year of professional enrichment and non-degree graduate-level study in the United States for accomplished mid-level professionals from designated countries that have a wide range of development needs.

Fellows are nominated by U.S. Embassies or Fulbright Commissions based on their potential for leadership and a demonstrated commitment to public service. The program provides a basis for lasting ties between citizens of the United States and their professional counterparts in other countries. It fosters an exchange of knowledge and mutual understanding, through which the United States joins in a significant partnership with developing countries.

Fellows are placed in groups by professional field at selected U.S. universities offering specially designed programs of study and training. Fellowships are granted competitively to professional candidates in a variety of fields, including:

- Economic development/finance and banking
- Agricultural and rural development
- Natural resources, environmental policy, and climate change
- Human resource management
- Communications/journalism
- Teaching of English as a foreign language
- Educational administration, planning, and policy
- Substance abuse education, treatment, and prevention
- HIV/AIDS policy and prevention
- Public health policy and management
- Public policy analysis and public administration
- Law and human rights
- Urban and regional planning
- Trafficking in persons - policy and prevention
- Technology policy and management
- Higher education administration

Applicants are required to have an undergraduate degree, a minimum of five years of substantial professional experience, limited or no prior experience in the United States, demonstrated leadership qualities, a record of public service in the community, and strong English skills.

The Humphrey Program is a Fulbright exchange activity. Its primary funding is provided by the U.S. Congress through the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs of the U.S. Department of State. Co-sponsors include other governmental agencies, multinational organizations, and private donors. The Institute of International Education (IIE) assists the U.S. Department of State in administering the Humphrey Fellowship Program.

Basic Eligibility Criteria:

- an undergraduate (first university) degree
- a minimum of five years of full-time professional experience
- limited or no prior experience in the United States demonstrated leadership qualities
- a record of public service in the community
- English language ability (TOEFL exam mandatory)

THE Embassy will accept only electronic submissions of applications through the Embark system. The applications must include:

- Online application on Embark:

- TOEFL scores report of a minimum of 525 (paper based) or 71 of IBT
- Academic transcripts and diploma in the original version and English-language translations
- Work of experience of minimum of 5 years (copy of work certificates in the original version and English language translations)
